PEMBURY ATHLETIC YOUTH FOOTBALL CLUB IN PARTNERSHIP WITH PEMBURY PARISH COUNCIL NET FOOTBALL FUNDING BOOST

FOOTBALLERS IN Pembury were celebrating in early January following a **£386,502** award to Pembury Athletic (Youth) FC in partnership with Pembury Parish Council by the Football Foundation, the UK's largest sports charity.

The cash bonanza will allow the partnership to build a state-of-the-art sports pavilion on the Pembury Recreation Ground at the heart of the community.

The Football Foundation is dedicated to revitalising the grass roots of the game,

constructing modern football facilities, developing football as a force for social cohesion and as a vehicle for education in communities throughout the country. Funded by the FA Premier League, The Football Association, Sport England and the Government, the Football Foundation is the nation's largest sports charity with a £45m budget going straight into the heart of football.


LESLIE GREGORY

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PEMBURY PARISH COUNCIL REPORTS . . .

LOWER GREEN RECREATION GROUND CONSULTATION SURVEY

PEMBURY RESIDENTS were asked in October 2006 what their thoughts were about the suggested facilities in the Recreation Ground and also if they had new ideas for further development and facilities.

After individual numbering and logging of forms, it was established that 198 replies were received of which four were from outside Pembury, five were anonymous and five blank; this left a base of 184 valid replies which represents over 7% of Pembury households.

Replies were entered on a spreadsheet and location map in order to process the raw data, and a report was prepared for presentation to the Amenities Working Group of Pembury Parish Council.

Main findings

92% supported the introduction of a youth area, with 6.5% against, the remainder no reply.

Asked about the suggested facilities – goals/basketball hoops; games area with railing; seating; low level skate park – some respondents marked the whole section rather than individual items; 32 yes and eight no. More respondents replied individually to the suggestions on the form. Not all the options were selected by every respondent, so raw numbers are probably more significant than percentages. Of those who replied, 120 said yes and 1 no for goals, etc; 97 said yes and 7 no for a games area with railings; seating, 115 yes and 3 no; and 91 yes and 15 no for a low level skate park. Additional facilities suggested for the youth area included: seats with cover against weather, aerial slide/runway/zip slide, bins, water fountain, and gym equipment.

There was a large majority for a quiet seating area for adults/older residents – 85.9%, with 8.7% against and the rest no reply. There was general concern that this area should be well maintained and not allowed to be taken over or damaged by disruptive elements.

A footpath link between Woodhill Park and Westway was well supported with 72% of respondents positive, 11.4% negative, 9.2% not sure/no opinion and the rest no reply. Concern was expressed about siting the path, but the Parish Council has already stated (Autumn Pembury Village News) that football pitches or other facilities will not be affected by the path.

Pembury residents responded magnificently with a wide range of imaginative ideas for other facilities! A cycle track, restaurant or café, toilets, crazy golf/putting green, adventure facilities for older children, more bins, adult fitness track/gym equipment, picnic tables and even an ice rink/water facilities!

Overall themes

Some themes and concerns recurred through the entire consultation.

1. It is important to ask young people themselves about the facilities to be provided.
2. Vandalism is a frequent concern. In the youth area, equipment must be vandal-proof.
3. Youth must 'own' the area and help look after it
4. The path link should be engineered so as to discourage motorised vehicles, especially motor bikes. A number suggested lighting the path, for security.
5. Any shelter will encourage gathering of youths whatever the weather.

6. Many respondents considered the park should provide something for every age.
7. Several feared that the seating area would get taken over by anti-social youths.
8. Additional security was a significant concern, with CCTV, a permanent park attendant, after dusk patrols and lighting the most frequent suggestions. Noise after dark, depositing of rubbish and vandalism by inebriated teenagers were perceived as being the most severe problems.

The next steps

The Amenities Working Group considered the full report in detail at its January

meeting and proposed that priorities should be: an area for youth with all-purpose sports markings and some equipment including a shelter and small scale street furniture park; a play area for 10-14 year olds; and the footpath link from Westway to Woodhill Park.

An immediate increase in security in the Recreation Ground was also proposed. The Parish Council approved all of these proposals at its meeting on 5 February. The fine detail of the plans will be worked out, specifications drawn up with interested partners such as the Kent Police Secure by Design team and then quotations sought. Watch this space!

CAB OUTREACH POINT AT PEMBURY LIBRARY

OVER THE past nine months Tunbridge Wells CAB has been providing a weekly advice service on Wednesday mornings in Pembury Library. This has proved to be a real success with an average of three clients being seen most weeks.

The service is provided by a fully trained Advisor providing advice on a variety of subjects ranging from benefits and employment to housing and consumer issues. If the matter cannot be resolved during the initial visit the Advisor will arrange an appointment for the client to either come back or visit the Bureau in Tunbridge Wells.

The current funding for this project ends in March 2007. We are currently looking at ways of attracting new funds from within the local community. If any local businesses are interested in sponsoring our weekly sessions they should contact the District Manager, Brian Wyld on 534328.

PEMBURY AND THE POLICE

IN LATE NOVEMBER, police executed four warrants in the Pembury area under the Misuse of Drugs Act. As a result five men, all from Tunbridge Wells addresses, were arrested. One arrest was for the possession of Class A drugs, one for the cultivation of cannabis, one for abstracting electricity and two for possession of Class C drugs.

At one of the addresses where a warrant was carried out officers discovered a hydroponics system and, what they believe to be approximately 30 or more cannabis plants, being grown in a shed in the garden. Officers also seized what they believe is the harvest of an earlier crop at the address.

Tunbridge Wells Chief Inspector Russell Nyman said: "The warrants we executed this morning have happened as a direct result of our officers listening to the views of the local community about the issues that matter to them. I want residents to know that we do listen and take appropriate action. We have a very effective neighbourhood police team in Pembury and Tunbridge Wells and there will be similar operations following on from today's to ensure we continue to work to fulfil the needs of local people."

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
THE TOUR DE FRANCE 2007 COMES TO PEMBURY (AGAIN!)

THE FIRST LEG of the 94th Tour de France will see the cream of the world's cyclists speeding from central London via Medway, Maidstone and the Weald including Pembury, before the finish in Canterbury.

The Tour is the world's biggest annual sporting event, attracting between 12 to 15 million roadside spectators and more than 2 billion watching on television. Britain has previously hosted stages of the Tour in 1974 and 1994 and this year will host the 'Grand Départ'. The three-day extravaganza begins with the opening ceremony in Trafalgar Square on Friday 6 July and continues with the prologue time trial around the streets of London on the Saturday. On the Sunday, the focus shifts to Kent when Stage One of the race travels across the county and finishes against the historic backdrop of Canterbury Cathedral.

The 2007 Stage One route begins in London, out via Gravesend then through Medway, Maidstone, Tonbridge, Royal Tunbridge Wells, Pembury, on to Tenterden, Ashford, Stone Street and into Canterbury for the finish.

The race enters Tunbridge Wells at Southborough, travels along the A26 into the town down Grosvenor Road into Crescent Road and out via Pembury Road to Matfield, Brenchley, Horsmonden, Goudhurst, and Sissinghurst and then on to Ashford.



The cavalcade that travels in front of the race is a huge procession of around 200 carnival-style decorated vehicles that gives out souvenirs, promotional items and other 'goodies' to spectators along the route (around 16 million gifts in 2006), making the Tour de France a fun family event as well as a superb sporting spectacle.

Because of the need to keep the riders, spectators and general public safe, the Tour takes place on completely closed roads, which means that affected roads (including bridges over the route) will be closed for several hours. Alternative routes will be signed. Tunbridge Wells Borough Council and Kent Highways will be providing detailed advice and information to people and businesses along the route. Little Rascals is a real dose of needed encouragement for the majority of the parents and the carers and the children enjoy it, too!






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YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORTS – LOCAL ACCIDENT & EMERGENCY SERVICES

THERE ARE few things more important than the care we receive following an accident, but you may have heard in the local press about a storm that's been brewing with regard to the Accident and Emergency service in Tunbridge Wells.

Over the last few years, despite a dedicated and skilled clinical workforce, our health service has descended deeper and deeper into financial crisis. Throughout the country deficits have grown in our hospital trusts and stories of bed, ward and indeed hospital closures illustrate a service on the brink of meltdown.

Health Secretary Patricia Hewitt has promised that she will erase all deficits – some £700 million nationally – by the end of this financial year and generate surpluses by the end of the next. At the same time, Maidstone and Tunbridge Wells Trust have formulated a radical plan to reconfigure services, creating savings and efficiencies in the process.

But change to our emergency services is invariably unpopular and many suspect that 'reconfigure' all too often means reduction. It was against this background that the changes to A&E were proposed.

Maidstone and Tunbridge Wells Hospital Trust felt that rather than sustaining two full A&E facilities at Maidstone and Kent & Sussex Hospitals respectively, it would instead develop one major specialist trauma centre in Tunbridge Wells and reduce services at Maidstone to specialise in heart attack and stroke cases which, it argued, formed the majority of blue-light admissions anyway. As the new hospital at Pembury opened, the Kent and Sussex would be closed and the major A&E would transfer to Pembury in due course.

Maidstone Hospital, which already has an excellent reputation for complex inpatient elective operations, would in turn grow its capacity in areas such as complex cancer care.

Response to the plan was swift and robust.

A demonstration at Mote Park in Maidstone saw public protestors joining with GPs and consultant surgeons. Kent County Council Leader Paul Carter said *"a lot of nonsense was being talked" by the Trust, commenting that "Kent County Council cannot support making such a change in isolation at a time of intense upheaval in the NHS"*.

KCC's own NHS Overview and Scrutiny

Committee met last month to hear representations from Rose Gibb, Chief Executive of Maidstone and Tunbridge Wells NHS Trust and Steve Phoenix, Chief Executive of the new West Kent Primary Care Trust. By a majority of just seven to six, the Committee voted to overturn the proposed plans. Rose Gibb commented *"I think the committee's decision is very*

unfortunate" and added *"... we are going to have to look at more radical solutions"*.

When the National Health Service was first launched back in 1948, one of its essential principles was to provide the best possible care for local people close to home. And whilst A&E demand in Maidstone is also served from Medway Maritime, the William Harvey in Ashford, the QEQM in Dover and the new Darent Valley Hospital in Dartford, our own Kent and Sussex Hospital is aptly named after the two catchments it is called upon to serve.

If we lost our A&E at Kent and Sussex Hospital, it would mean emergency blue-light traffic having to travel to Maidstone via Colts Hill. At the best of times, the road is slow and dangerous. When every second counts for a critical case in the back of an ambulance, I shudder to think how the regular traffic jams might affect the outcome.

To deny the people of Tunbridge Wells a quality A&E facility is unthinkable, which is why our MP Greg Clark has campaigned so vigorously and why at County level I have met with the Cabinet Member for Public Health, Graham Gibbens, to argue in the strongest terms that we must retain quality local health services for local people.

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

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PAVILION PLANS

PEMBURY PAVILION – ‘RAISING THE ROOF’

THE FINAL PUSH is on to find the last piece of the fundraising gap for the new community pavilion. This building will be a community-wide facility benefiting all age groups of the Parish. The building will provide a home for the Pembury Athletic Youth Football Club and other village groups and activities.

This initiative has been pioneered by PAYFC and Pembury Parish Council to provide: “A home for all, at the heart of our community, in Lower Green Recreation Ground, Pembury.”

Through enormous efforts by the PAYFC and Pembury Parish Council partnership, we have now secured £456,502 of the £482,502 needed to build this new facility.

A grant of £386,502 (80% of the total project costs) has been awarded to the partnership by the Football Foundation (*see page 3*), and further grant applications have been submitted to other prominent local organisations.

However, we still need to find the shortfall of £6,000 to complete the build cost.

The building works must start in MAY 2007 and, in order to comply with the funding criteria, all the monies have to be in place before works can commence. Further funds are also needed to kit out the new building with furnishings, equipment etc.

We are asking you, **the COMMUNITY OF PEMBURY**, to work with us and raise these funds. PAYFC is holding a number of fundraising events which we hope you will find time to attend, and enjoy yourselves along the way. A “Raise the Roof” Disco was held on Saturday 3 February 2007 at the Village Hall and started the fundraising with a healthy £2,000.

Apart from just sending your donations direct to PAYFC via the Treasurer, Jane Ange-Payne, Priory Cottage, Romford Road, Pembury TN2 4JD there are several other events you can take part in . . .

“BUY A BRICK”

Every Pembury family and local business are invited to buy a brick for a special wall inside the new pavilion. Bricks will be etched with local people’s names and businesses and cost £70 per family (with individual rates for businesses), and additional bricks at £15. You can buy as many bricks as you wish and have your name(s) engraved on the face of the brick for posterity, and built into the “**PEMBURY WALL OF FAME**”.

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
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M.O.T. TESTS

PEMBURY PEOPLE – DENISE BARNES

MANY OF US, I am sure, will recognise the value and importance of our local businesses in the village. Too often the sobering caveat of ‘use it or lose it’ leaves a sad legacy with many neighbouring communities being left barren, devoid of shops and enterprise that once provided a local service for local needs. One name that has become synonymous with Pembury, as a stakeholder and as a valued resident, is Denise Barnes. Her business on the High Street has become a familiar landmark for the many who wish to reside in our special community and I am grateful that she has agreed to be featured as one of my ‘Pembury People’.



Denise originally comes from Norfolk, but at 19 she married an American and lived in the States for ten years during which time she got divorced. She then lived and worked in Geneva, at United Nations, then Zurich as a chauffeuse to a Swiss ‘gnome’, and later spent a year in Germany. When she returned to England, her friend had just become the cook to Mr and Mrs Teacher and Lady d’Avigdor-Goldsmid at Somerhill, which is now a private school. When Denise needed a home, Mrs Teacher invited her to take one of the empty flats at Somerhill, where she lived in a ‘grander style than she was accustomed to’ for two years! Later, her sister, Carole, and her mother both moved to Pembury.

Denise eventually re-married and began training as an estate agent in Sevenoaks. Promotion brought her to Pembury as manager of Prall Champion & Prall (now Your Move). She found Pembury a thriving and friendly village, and three years later she decided it would be a perfect place to set up her own estate agency. That was 19 years ago and it made sense, as the business grew, to make her home in Pembury.

Those were the heady days of 1988. Denise remembers how there used to be a queue of people waiting for her to open the office well before 9am so they could get their offer in before anyone else on a house they had probably seen just once, and had made a decision in less time than it takes to choose a raincoat.

It was too good to last and only nine months later a four-year recession kicked in. But Denise battled on, opening her second branch in Horsmonden during this time; many people thought her mad, but it became another successful branch. She sold the business two years ago which had expanded to seven branches and 45 staff two years ago, as in her own words, she wanted a complete change and pursue something she’d always loved, but rarely had the time – writing.

She had made notes over the last (wait for it) 30 years, but only six months after selling, she had finished her first book called *‘From Bad to Worst’*. It’s about a year she spent in 1973 as a vegetarian cook at a health clinic in Bavaria, knowing no German and virtually no cooking! She says it’s more of ‘a woman’s book’ and hopes it will make her readers laugh. However, we’re assured that men aren’t banned from reading it! The book is to be published this summer and Denise is hoping to give a talk in the library, not to mention making some sales. You can’t hold down even an ex-estate agent where there’s a sales opportunity!

With more spare time than she's ever had, although she remains a consultant for her old business and is deeply interested in its progress, she has become a governor at Tunbridge Wells High School. One of the practical things she enjoys is helping children who have difficulty reading.

"I adored reading when I was a child. I never minded being punished and sent to bed early as I always had a book on the go and my trusty torch," she recounts. "Helping these children gives me enormous pleasure, particularly when they finally catch up with the rest of their class, and say they are now actually enjoying reading which they used to find boring."

Denise has just completed the Silk Road from Moscow to Beijing by train, and if that three-week 12,000-mile trip wasn't going to be long enough, she decided to go all the way by train from London to Moscow. At the moment she is planning her next trip to Australia (travelling all over the country by train again) with her sister in March. She says with a grin that she *has* to go as it's 'research' for the novel she's writing – I'm sure we all believe her!

When asked why she still lives in Pembury she answers: "In some ways, it's still quite old-fashioned, which I like, and I've made some close friends in the village over the years. It's also very handy for Tunbridge Wells. And being loyal to Pembury seems a good way of showing my gratitude to the people who gave me such incredible support when I broke away from the corporates to start my own business all those years ago."

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
PEMBURY TENNIS CLUB

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JAN'S GARDEN VIEWS

AS WE HEAD into SPRING, usually a time of renewal and anticipation, we leave behind an unseasonal winter of prolonged rain, high winds and mildness. As we gardeners wrestle with climate change we need to have an understanding of the concept of global warming and the impact on our environment. Springs will be longer and a longer growing season will be one of the main benefits, and an opportunity to grow a wider range of plants. An increase in carbon dioxide and temperature will increase plant growth, resulting in larger plants that produce more, and larger, blooms. However, there could be a few threats, with too much early growth being prone to damage by possible late frosts. So our tender plants will need protection.

With strange weather up and down the country, gardeners are reporting odd occurrences of unseasonable blooms and luxuriant growth that will put plants under stress with their inability to procreate at the right time of year. The warmth of the winters will affect the flowering of several species; prunus and ribes need cold to stimulate flower-bud formation, while most bulbs need low temperatures to encourage root development. If you are planning new planting, do research drought-tolerant species. For some suggestions, see www.rhs.org.uk/learning/research/climate_change/plants.asp.

If we start to plan now, the climate changes will be more of an enjoyable challenge for our garden management - from soil to design. Soil is likely to be affected with organic matter breaking down faster and being washed away in heavy rain. For an existing plot, simple and effective changes can be made. Water management will be crucial - particularly good drainage. Raised beds would help reduce water-logged roots. Wind-breaks will reduce storm damage and evaporation from the soil by drying winds. Mulching will be a necessity; in summer to keep soil moist and cool; in winter to protect it from extremes of cold and wet weather, and also to keep weeds down.

So having adapted your gardens for near future changes, we can consider alternative planting. Plant breeders are producing more drought-tolerant annuals, so search the seed catalogues for choice. Among perennials that can stand extremes of temperature are cannas, buddleia, pittosporum and fuschias. Ground-cover plants could be very

useful. Their foliage helps to retain moisture, suppress weeds and their roots prevent erosion. The wide range available cover all sites, from sunny to shade.



If our summers become hotter, then shade will become imperative for us in the garden, and seating areas may need to be re-sited. Pots and tubs which are a standard feature in many gardens will be better placed in shady areas as they tend to dry out quickly. They will need to have water-retentive granules added to the soil and be topped with a mulch. The use of containers always adds interest and colour to steps, paths and patios. Consider new planting combinations of herbs, dwarf conifers, alpiners or heathers.

With all these changes in mind let us continue with our main jobs for spring. After a winter of nutrient-leaching rain, plants are hungry and need sustaining. A balanced fertiliser of fish, blood and bone will boost the soil's vital humus reserves. March sees lawns begin to grow again, so spike to improve drainage and apply a good fertiliser before mowing, and keep the cut high. Roses and summer-flowering heathers should be pruned. Heathers need a light clipping with shears. Fork the soil lightly around roses, fertilise and mulch with mature manure. Hardy annuals can be sown and gladioli planted. Half-hardy seeds can be sown under glass for planting out in late May or early June.

April is probably the best month for planting evergreen trees, shrubs and conifers. Protect from cold winds with horticultural fleece for a few weeks. Lawns can be sown this month. Shrubs that have flowered and finished flowering since the autumn can now be pruned - Forsythia quite hard. Thin out your hardy annual seedlings when large enough to handle.

May should see the last of any frosts and your bedding plants can go out, together with hanging baskets and tubs for a glorious summer show - enjoy!

PEMBURY IN THE PAST

WARTIME MEMORIES OF PEMBURY HOSPITAL 1940-1946

I STARTED WORK at Pembury Hospital in the early part of the War as a painter and decorator for a Mr Lawrence, Builder, Five Oak Green. He had signed a contract with Pembury Hospital to do contract maintenance work for five years. I was 14 years old at the time and was signed up as an apprentice painter. We had a large team of tradesmen and six of us apprentices other trades.

The tradesmen's first job was to erect huts for the incoming Dunkirk patients. Once they settled in, those who were not confined to their beds were allowed to walk around the hospital grounds. They were in special uniforms; light blue trousers and jackets, white shirts, red ties and many were seen walking the grounds.

Before we started work at the hospital, we had a talk by the Matron and lady Almoner, she was the social worker employed by the hospital. We had a warning by the Matron never to buy from the hospital shop, cigarettes, tobacco, aspirin and Aspro for any patient. Pembury had many nursing staff – Pembury Nurses, Guy Nurses, Auxiliary Red Cross and Army Nurses.

Pembury had their own cleaners who wore brown smocks and brown skull caps and were called ward maids. The Matron warned us not to fraternise with them as they had babies out of marriage and the babies were adopted.

I noticed at the start of the winter months tramps would arrive, staying until the end of March. They were clothed and fed, some even done odd jobs in the gardens.

Blackout Regulations

My first job was to paint outside window panes of glass with black matt paint. The hospital could not afford inside so windows had blackout screen curtains. Only trouble was the window panes I had painted, the wards had to have lights on day and night.

We also had the job to camouflage roofs with colour paints – brown, green and grey. Unfortunately, as the ward progressed our tradesmen were called up for active service. The boss came to me one day and said he was going on a rest period over in Ireland. He was putting me in charge of the apprentice painters. However, he also had signed a contract with British Rail to have the loan of eight of their lady painters. I would be in charge of them and assign work to them, reference his instructions. I was only 16 years now, but these ladies were first class painters, a credit to British Rail.

Sadly, they had to leave. They were called for national service, so we were left with apprentices and elderly men. One even had a wooden stump leg called 'peg leg Arthur'.

One day a nurse asked me "Did I have some bright silver paint?" I said "Yes". She had been invited to a Saturday evening dance at the Assembly Hall in Tunbridge Wells. She couldn't afford new dance shoes and asked me if I could paint her old shoes with silver paint. I said I would give it a try. It was a success. After two coats of paint I charged her six pence a pair (old money).

My boss arrived back from his Ireland break unexpectedly and caught me painting shoes in silver paint, by then I had painted over a dozen. He asked what I was charging per pair. I said six pence. He said give them their money back, as it was his paint and I could continue to paint the nurses shoes in my own time.

Myself, I left to go into the Army in 1944, but only for a short period. I returned back to Pembury late in 1945 and my first job was to clean off all that paint I had put on the windows and replace broken glass, which took me six weeks.

Just outside the main gates at Pembury Hospital was a brick bus shelter with a concrete roof, it may be still there! I helped to build this shelter early part of the War. We put a concrete flat roof on it for safety from falling shrapnel. Of course, I have many remarkable experiences, one could write a book about Pembury Hospital during the Second World War.

CRIME IN PEMBURY

WE ARE ALREADY well into the New Year but the crime figures for the last quarter of 2006 were disheartening to say the least; criminal damage increased by an alarming 50% on the previous quarter from 16 to 24 and theft 100% from 6 to 12 and the overall reported incidents increased from 51 to 63, over 20%.

This is totally unacceptable and does not include the number of crimes which do not get reported. Theft is in our own hands to some extent but criminal damage, which mainly happens at night, is difficult to control.

The police obviously cannot patrol every road every hour in the evening, so what is the answer? Perhaps parish appointed wardens patrolling in twos and threes with contact facilities? If you have any other ideas, please let me know; but not vigilante gangs, although I suspect some of you

would like to go that route. Perhaps each road could organise its own look-out group; somehow we have to rid our streets of the anti-social elements which inflict this continuous damage. Please be sure, though, to report any incidents to the police.

Moving on, another issue that requires urgent attention is the speed of traffic moving through the village, especially on Lower Green Road and Henwood Green Road. Whether it is local traffic or through traffic, especially rat-running off the A21, it has to be slowed down before someone is killed. As the television advert states, 30mph is there for a reason and it's not to protect the motorist.

ROSIE'S RECIPES

WITH EASTER and Spring in mind I have chosen some recipes which I feel could be enjoyed on Easter Sunday or even Mothering Sunday. Men, why not treat your ladies and give these recipes a try!

Salmon in Puff Pastry

Ingredients – serves

8 people

900g (2lb) salmon fillet
 350g (12oz) frozen asparagus spears, defrosted or canned, drained
 1 tbsp chopped fresh dill
 Salt and pepper, to taste
 3 tbsp double cream
 350g (12oz) puff pastry, defrosted if frozen
 Beaten egg, to glaze
 Dill sprigs and cucumber slices, to garnish



Preparation

Cut salmon in half through the middle. Blend $\frac{1}{2}$ of asparagus and mix with dill, seasoning and cream. Spread over one piece of salmon, top with reserved asparagus and remaining salmon. Heat oven to 220°C (425°F/Gas 7). Roll out pastry into an oblong slightly longer than the salmon and $2\frac{1}{2}$ times as wide. Place salmon in centre. Make diagonal cuts through exposed pastry on both sides. Cut towards you, leaving a $2\frac{1}{2}$ cm (1in) gap between cuts. Brush edges of pastry with egg. Fold pastry strips over to form a plait and seal in salmon. Place on a damp baking sheet, brush with egg and cook for 20 mins. Reduce oven to 190°C (375°F/Gas 5) and cook for further 15-20mins. Garnish. This can also be served cold.

This next dish is really easy and you could use fresh peppers with a tin of sweet corn instead of the mixed tin of peppers and sweet corn.



French-Style Sauté Potatoes

Ingredients: Serves

4 or double the quantity to go round 8 people

550g (1 $\frac{1}{4}$ lbs) potatoes, cut into cube 1cm ($\frac{1}{2}$ in)
 1 tbsp vegetable oil

25g (1oz) butter
 1 onion, chopped
 340g (12oz) can sweet corn with peppers, well drained.

Preparation:

Heat oil and butter in a large frying pan, add potatoes and sauté for 8-10 mins. Add onions and gently sauté for 5 mins or until potatoes and onions are tender. Add sweet corn and cook for 2-3 mins until hot. Transfer to a warmed serving dish using a draining spoon and serve.

Sticky Toffee Pudding

Ingredients: serves 4-6 people)

60g (2oz) soft margarine
 50g (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz) butter
 200g (7oz) white sugar
 250g (8oz) plain flour
 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
 1 egg, whisked
 185g (6oz) stoned, chopped dates
 1 tsp vanilla essence
 65g (2 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz) light brown sugar
 2 tbsp double cream
 250ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ pt) boiling water

Preparation:

Cream together the margarine and sugar. Sift together the flour and baking power. Beat the whisked egg and vanilla essence into a creamed mixture with a little of the flour and baking powder and continue beating for about a minute before adding the rest of the flour/baking power. Chop the dates and flour lightly. Pour the boiling water over the dates and mix in the bicarbonate of soda and add the date mixture to the batter, mixing well. Place in a buttered dish and bake for 40 mins at 170°C (325°F/Gas 3). When pudding is cooked, heat the brown sugar, butter and cream and simmer gently for 3 minutes. Pour over the pudding and place under a grill until it starts to bubble. Serve with cream, ice cream or custard.

Note: When the sponge is cooked I use a skewer to pierce holes in it before pouring the sauce over and then put it back in the oven for 5 mins rather than grill it.
