VIEWPOINT

no-one really enjoys paying them

5-2p in the E. - why that's even higher than Tunbridge Wells! This must have been in the thoughts of many Parishioners as they received their Rate Bill and noticed the Pembury Special Expenditure Rate and many more may have jumped to the conclusion that the Parish Council was asking Ratepayers in the Parish for more money than it takes to run Tunbridge Wells! Of course this is not true, to give a true comparison your Rate Bill would have read Tunbridge Wells 4.2p in the Pound — Pembury £77.00p in the Pound! That would be the rate required in order to raise the same amount of money that Tunbridge Wells spends.

What then does 5.2p in the Pound mean for Pembury, it means that with a rate product of £4,892 this raises the sum of £25,438 in order to administer Parish Affairs. To contrast this in order to raise a similar amount in Paddock Wood it would only cost their Parishioners 3.1p in the Pound — 2.1p less!

This is because they have a penny rate product of £8,225 which reflects the Industry in their Parish. Is this equitable? Should Pembury pay more than Paddock Wood to raise the same amount?

How much of that £25,438 do you contribute through your Rates?

Well, with 2,000 houses in Pembury it means that out of a £200 Rate Bill -£12 goes to the Parish Council the other £188 to the Borough Council and the Kent County Council = £12 a year less than 24p a week - with that money Pembury Parish Council administers its two Recreation Grounds (now with four Football Pitches) two Lawn Tennis Courts. one Hard Court, a Bowling Green, a Putting Green, three Burial Grounds, a Village Hall, the Village Green. In addition this year we are having to spend over £4,000 for new play equipment in the Recreation Ground which includes a new Kindergarten play area and £4,500 for work to be

started on permanent Changing Rooms for the Footballers in the Woodside Playing Fields. We are also financing improvements to the Village Hall.

Contrary to the widely held view, if any improvements to the Social life or any additions to the amenities of the Village are required it is not the Borough Council but the Villagers themselves who have to pay for them by adding the cost to the Special Expenses Rate, which at the moment is 5.2p in the Pound — this is where we came in!







Another factor that has increased the Rates payable by us all in the Parishes is a compulsory rate equalisation scheme which the Borough Council has implemented over the last few years which has slowly brought the Parish Rate up to that of the present Rate of the Borough Council. The implications behind this scheme to the Parish of Pembury is another story and I will be telling you more about that in the next issue.



Since the last Newsletter three fresh Councillors have been appointed by the co-option procedure to fill vacancies caused by the resignations for various reasons of Mr. Ballantine, Mr. Nankivell and Mrs. Toler.

- Mr. Thomas was the first to be co-opted. He is 33 years old and a Junior School Headmaster in the Borough of Bromley. He has two children, his five year old daughter attends the Pembury County Primary School. He is particularly interested in becoming involved in work which will have some bearing on the future of Pembury and in particular the environmental aspects of the Village. He sees himself very much in sympathy with the recommendations of Pembury 2000 and hopes to be able to contribute to the fulfilment of its aims.
- The second newcomer is Mr. A. J. Stuart-Robson who is 28 years old and married with a boy aged 4. He is with a large national finance company and his wife is the Principal of a ballet school in the village.

His special interests in Pembury are aspects of Conservation and improvement of the Village. the PEMBURY PARISH CHURCH repair appeal

DENNIS OULD writes:

Since the Appeal to raise £12,000 to save and restore the Parish Church was launched in January, there has been a most generous and heart warming response.

Letters and contributions have been received, not only from well wishers in the Village, but from former residents scattered throughout this country and abroad. As a result nearly £9,000 is now to hand and the future of the Church must be assured. Included in that figure is some £1,300 contributed during the House to House collection which took place during April and particular thanks are due to the collectors who braved some very unpleasant weather to complete that task. We now know well over 1000 true Friends of the Parish Church coming as they do from every religious persuasion and many too who for a variety of reasons are not prepared to see this fine and ancient Church fall into disrepair.

The actual repairs will be commenced with the least possible delay now that the architects from the Diocese and the Historic Buildings Trust have agreed on the work necessary to be done. Specifications are being prepared and tenders will then be invited. All this is highly specialised work and cannot be undertaken without proper preparation but every possible action is being taken to expedite the arrangements.

It is recognised that the last £3,000 required to reach the target will be the most difficult to raise but hopes are high and to this end certain events have been arranged during the year and the greatest possible support for these will be very welcome.

VANDALISM

COSTS THE PARISH COUNCIL OVER £500 A YEAR - ARE YOU DOING ALL YOU CAN TO STOP THIS MENACE?

On January 31st last at the Garden Hall Club, Wood Street, Tunbridge Wells a meeting was held of the Tunbridge Wells Social Services and Welfare Organisations together with representatives from many Pembury Organisations to see if a Community Help Scheme could be got off the ground in our Village.

The Chairman for the night Mr. V. O'Connell a Principal Social Worker for Tunbridge Wells explained that he was involved in the Pembury area because of his social work with the Kent County Council.

He went on to explain to the meeting how he had become aware of people in need of help in the Pembury area who did not require the professional services of Doctors, Solicitors, Churches and Social Workers. He also pointed out how he had become aware of other people in the community who are asking how they could help but not knowing how to go about offering this help.

A very detailed discussion followed which is impossible to record in our Village Newsletter. However, a suggestion from Dr. Loden that the Village Newsletter in its next issue should carry in a prominent position a notice about the proposed scheme was accepted.

The Doctor approached the Editor and it was agreed to advertise the scheme in the next issue.

This immediately brought up the question of how it was to be advertised, who was to do the advertising, and under whose co-ordination the pilot scheme should be promoted. Most important of all a single person was required as the co-ordinator for this pilot scheme whose name could be announced at the appropriate time.

In view of the Pembury 2000 Action Committee's brief from the Parish Council to see all the Village Study Recommendations completed as soon as possible there seem to be distinct advantages in this Committee acting



initially as the co-ordinating body. The Committee have agreed to this and one of its members Mr. D. W. Betts, 132 Henwood Green Road, has in addition agreed for the first six months to be the co-ordinator both for requests for help and offers of help.

Owing to circumstances beyond our control and long delivery times from the Manufacturers it will now be the middle of July before the new playground equipment starts to be erected. The Kindergarten Equipment will be delivered first, the Junior section following approximately 2-4 weeks thereafter.

The Parish Council have chosen for the Kindergarten, one 11ft Kinder Slide: four 8ft swings in two bays, two swings with cradle seats and two with flat honeycomb edged rubber safety seats; a Mini Carousel and a Play House, which will double as a small climbing frame and finally two seesaws. The Council intend to fence this area off.

In the Junior Section of the Play Ground, we have ordered four 10ft swings in two bays with four flat honeycomb edged rubber safety seats; one non bumper Seesaw and two items which will be new to the Playground itself, one an agility system the other two plane swings.


