Comment

As all the residents of Pembury know, we have suffered problems of anti-social behaviour and vandalism for many years. You will also know from the local press and television that because of perceived inaction by the Police, relationships between them and the Parish Council became somewhat frosty earlier this year.

It is, therefore, very encouraging to be able to report that both the Police and your local Council now recognise that positive joint action is required if we are ever to really solve the issues of such concern to parishioners. As a result of some very direct talking between the Police and the Parish Council, a joint working group has been set up, under the Chairmanship of Parish Councillor Betty Roberts. This will bring together the Police and the local community and

- agree what the local problems of crime, vandalism and anti-social behaviour actually are and when they occur;
- set action targets and establish methods of dealing with these; and
- monitor progress so that we can all see the improvements that result.

This working group, which has just had its first meeting, will rely upon village organisations – and particularly the valuable Neighbourhood Watch. It will, however, need the support of all the residents of Pembury if it is really going to work. This means parents accepting responsibility for

their children, householders and car owners ensuring the security of their property and all of us being alert and reporting any suspicious circumstances to the Police.

Anti-social behaviour and vandalism can, however, be manifested in many different ways. It is not just "yobbos".

For example, at the end of April your Parish Councillors took part in the Tidy Britain Group Clean-up and in just a few hours collected an amazing amount of litter from the streets of Pembury. It is no use blaming the Borough Council's cleaning services – most of the litter is deposited by the residents of Pembury.

Similarly, dog fouling is also a major antisocial problem in Pembury and it is no use blaming the dogs! Any dog owner who allows her/his animal to foul the public footpath or one of the parks and open spaces where young children play, is as anti-social as a drunken yobbo on a Saturday night.

If we are all corporately to do something about Pembury and eradicate vandalism and anti-social behaviour, then we need to both work together and to stop and think about our own actions.

MAKE A NOTE IN YOUR DIARY – it's an event not to be missed! Despite fears that this year's Fete was not going to take place I am pleased to say that with the co-operation of the Scouts and Guides, the Junior Football Club – Pembury Athletic, and the Parish Council (as co-ordinator) the Fete will continue to be a major event in the village.

With a new organising committee, fresh ideas have been discussed and accepted. The first will be that in future the event will be known as the Pembury Village Fayre.

The other major change is that there will be no arena this year but instead a stage will be erected and live music will be performed throughout the afternoon. There will be no Scout and Guide parade from the village green which has always been a headache to organise in the past. Amberside Dance Studio will also put on a review performance and a Punch and Judy show has been arranged for the children. GILL'S GARDEN

Remains of winter flowering bedding should be removed by now and replaced either by permanent planting or annuals which have been completely hardened off.

Bulbs which did not flower in the spring should be lifted after the leaves have turned yellow and, after cleaning, be allowed to dry before being replanted in the Autumn.

You should now weed, water plants and apply a mulch of organic compost. Pulverised bark or even weathered sawdust can be added around the plants to conserve the moisture. Rock plants should be surrounded by gravel or loose chippings.

Water the plants either early in the morning or late in the evening and once a week use a liquid fertiliser.

Shrubs which have finished flowering can be pruned by removing old or unwanted branches and cutting back to new growth. Brooms should have branches shortened but do not cut into old wood. Remove dead heads off Azaleas and Rhododendrons and together with Hydrangeas, keep well watered.

In August herbaceous plants that have finished flowering may be cut down to half their original size. Pansies and Violas can be increased by root cuttings.

Hardy annuals such as Godetia, Larkspur and Candytuft can be planted in situ to bloom early next year.

Start planting Autumn flowering bulbs such as Colchiums, Nerines and Sternbergias under trees and among shrubs.

Climbing and rambling roses that have finished flowering can be pruned and a dressing of potash can be given to help ripen remaining stems.

Finally the lawn should be mown with a high cut leaving the clippings on the lawn. A liquid fertilizer can be used to ensure healthy growth. The use of a weed killer in times of drought is not recommended.

of Notcutts will be hosting a special evening on Tuesday 18th June at 7.30-9.30pm to show you how to be successful with your hanging baskets. He will demonstrate how to plant up baskets and containers and how to take care of them. Everyone is invited and Nottcutts will provide complimentary refreshments. There will be plenty of time between the demonstration and the judging to plant up the entry.

To give a lead to villagers the Parish Council has entered a new competition – The Best Village Green – which has been instigated by Councillor Wally Stone, the recent past Mayor of Royal Tunbridge Wells. This will embrace any open space for public use and will probably be judged towards the end of June. As part of our involvement in this competition the Parish Council has submitted Coronation Garden, a small public garden situate on the Hastings Road near to its junction with the A21 by pass. Whether the Parish Council win the trophy or not, hopefully it will give us the incentive to have a public garden to be proud of.

This small piece of land was given to the Parish Council by the then Tonbridge Rural District Council in 1951 and after it was renovated, it was decided to call it Coronation Garden to commemorate the Coronation of our present Queen which took place in 1953.

PEMBURY SCHOOL

Most of us retain vivid memories of our first days at school, probably because it is such a big step in our lives. Walking to school on one's own, catching the bus to secondary school, going for the first time into town with friends, learning to drive and leaving home are all steps to greater independence. Starting school may well be the first time that Mum isn't there, and this is why it is a major step.

Children can sometimes miss their mother and feel insecure. If they are tearful, it is important to explain to them before making the journey to school what is going to happen. Explain that when they get to school they'll be handed over to the teacher and Mummy will be leaving but that she will be back at lunchtime to pick them up. It is important not to loiter but to hand your child to the teacher and go.

It can be distressing for you as a parent being at home worrying whether or not your child is still crying. I never mind parents phoning me up asking me to check if their child has settled. I can honestly say that on the occasions when parents have phoned me and I have checked I have never, in my ten years as a Head, ever found a child still crying when I have visited the classroom. There are so many other children around them and things to do that they easily become diverted.

I also think that we, as parents, may have mixed feelings about our child starting school. The majority of children settle in to school, make friends and find it exciting. It can be hurtful if they don't miss us. We may need to think about our feelings as well as our child's.

It can be very distressing if your child is upset about something that has happened at school and is tearful. It can pose a dilemma for you. On the one hand you can be concerned for your child, but on the other you may feel that he/she has to learn to cope and if you go into school will they think 'I'm fussing'? I make a firm promise that I will not accuse you of fussing. Far better to come to school and talk through issues with the staff than to worry and not discuss it. The majority of issues can be easily resolved by talking together.

It is important for all of us, parents and teachers, to remember that the quality of the children's education is enhanced when we both see it as a partnership and work together.

I hope your child's entry into school will be something that they can look back on in years to come with happy memories.

THE LEAGUE OF THE FRIENDS OF PEMBURY HOSPITAL

THE League of the Friends of Pembury Hospital was formed in 1953 and is an extremely active and vibrant association, raising funds to buy much needed equipment and supplying voluntary helpers to assist in many different ways within the hospital. The League of Friends Shop at the Hospital is open 364 days a year, is manned entirely by volunteers and serves the needs of patients and staff alike.

The main fund-raising event of the year is the Fete which is held in the hospital grounds and which starts at 1pm on Saturday 24th August this year. Do put the date in your diaries and come and join us. There really is something for everyone. In 1994, the proceeds of the fete bought an ambulance for transporting patients around the Pembury site and last year a ventilator was purchased for the Maternity Department.

The Antenatal Clinic at Pembury Hospital has changed its name to the 'Women's Health Centre' and under its roof a variety of treatments are now available . . . not just antenatal care. The League has once again been involved in this new development and has agreed a grant towards the cost of a urodynamic machine for diagnosis and treatment of incontinence problems. All outpatient maternity and gynaecological services will be centred in this clinic, together with colposcopy, hysteroscopy and, in the near future, endocrinology.

BOROUGH COUNCIL ELECTIONS 1996

Under the election by thirds system – by which a third of a Council's seats are up for election each year – the Pembury seat of Terry Cload (Conservative) was up for re-election. In an election where inclement weather resulted in a reduced number of the parishioners going to the poll, the result was as follows:



Bruce Ballantine (Liberal Democrat) - 710 votes Terry Cload (Conservative) - 630 votes Kit Kelly (Independent - Pembury Popular Front) - 176 votes Patrick Sellars (Labour) - 166 votes.

Bruce Ballantine, Pembury's new Borough Councillor, came to live in Pembury in 1971 and was a member of a series of local groups who played a significant role in the successful 'campaign to By-Pass Pembury'. He was a Parish Councillor from 1976 to 1979 but had to retire from the Council when he moved abroad. Bruce is married to Barbara and they have a grown-up son and a daughter aged 17. He is a governor of Tunbridge Wells Girls' School and his interests cover music, bridge and golf. He has now retired from full-time business which he says will enable him to devote more time and effort to local

PEMBURY IN THE PAST

PEMBURY ROAD NAMES

I am indebted to several parishioners who have written to me following the article on Pembury road names in the last two issues of this magazine.

With regard to the Cornford names in the article, my correspondent has informed me that only Cornford Court is named after Cornford House, Cornford Court, which I omitted to mention in my article, is not really a road it is just a small block of flats built in the garden of the big house.

I am told that Cornford Close and Cornford Park are named after Cornford Lane as is Cornford House itself.

However, Cornford Lane was named after Cornford Farm, an old farmhouse which had many interesting aspects such as a well in the big stone-flagged cellar. About 20-25 years ago a farm school for handicapped boys moved into this farm from Larkfield near Maidstone and changed the name to Larkfield Hall.

It is understood that Cornford House was built about 1930 as a wedding present for the daughter of the owner of Grovehurst, the large Victorian house which used to be on the other side of Cornford Lane. When this was pulled down, they needed dynamite to clear the site because it was so solid. Its two lodges still stand at the corner of Cornford Lane and just before St. George's School on the Pembury Road.

Does any one know where the name Cornford originated? Some people think that it came from a crossing of the stream which runs from Dunorlan Lake to the farm where its original access was from Cornford Lane, opposite the house called 'Stillness'.

I have also been told what may be the answer to my final question as to how Half Moon Lane obtained its name. I am informed by a parishioner who lived in Half Moon Lane for thirty years prior to moving into the village in 1988 that it probably took its name from the Half Moon Inn, which was situated about

three quarters of the way down from the A21 to Allders Lane in Capel. The house is still there but is now a private property. I am informed that an old gentleman, who my correspondent used to know, died in the late sixties or thereabouts at the age of around about 85. He told him that his grandfather could just remember it being closed down when he was a small boy. Which poses the question, 'why would an Inn with thirteen rooms be on a small back lane or was Half Moon Lane a main road all those years ago?'

Another little known fact is that there used to be an isolation hospital in Half Moon Lane, just a few yards further down from the cottage that my correspondent used to live in. His wife remembers being taken there with diphtheria when she was a small child. I

would guess that the Hospital was closed down in the late forties or early fifties.

If you have any early memories of Pembury or know of any stories passed on by your family, please let the Editor or his Committee know so that we can share the fascination of Pembury's earlier years.

MEMORIES

Florence Elizabeth Giles (25.12.1913-3.4.96)

Sadly, Mrs Florence Elizabeth Giles passed away on 3rd April this year. Mrs Giles and her husband Bill, who died 23 years ago, had three children, June, Peter and Barbara (who is now our Parish Clerk).

The Giles' always lived at Number 6 The Grove and I used to live next door with my parents and brothers and sisters. My memories of Mrs Giles go right back to my school days when Peter was one of our playmates. Mrs Giles was quite awesome, being strict on discipline and never tolerating any nonsense. There were times when my sister and I used to have a scrap with each other if my parents were out and before we knew it Mrs Giles would appear and give us a rollicking that any Sergeant Major would have been proud of.

The best part of the day was when we had gone out to play in the Grove Field or Gimble Grove Woods after school. Peter knew that to be late home was asking for trouble and at a given time the signal to go home would be heard. 'P-c-c-t-e-e-r' would come the call, starting on a low note and ending on a high. The effect was devastating and the only likeness I can make is the call for one minute's silence on Remembrance Day. # Everything stopped and then Peter would turn and head for home.

In The Grove, our kitchens used to be next to each other and in the evening there was always the sweet smell of carbolic or sunlight soap wafting between the two houses. At 6.45pm each night we knew that the next tune we would hear from Mrs Giles's radio would be 'The Archers' and I bet she could recall every episode!

Nearly every Sunday evening, Mr and Mrs Giles, my parents and all our brothers and sisters would go for a long walk, through the Horse Pastures, Brotherwoods Farm, Waterworks Woods and end up at Woodsgate Hotel for an ice cream and to watch the endless stream of London traffic and red buses heading back home from the coast.

In her latter years, after Bill Giles died, Mrs Giles got the wanderlust, going on several coaching holidays to Germany, Switzerland and Austria - and probably making many friends along the way.

More recently, whenever I have gone to her house for some of the Council Committee meetings, she has always been there in her favourite armchair in the corner of the front room. She would always enquire about the welfare of my mother or my family and we had some goodhearted banter. The twinkle in her eye and laugh were quite infectious but she would also express her deep concern at the decline of discipline and the lowering of standards that we accept today.

You do not forget someone like Mrs Giles and so, whilst it is farewell, it is not goodbye.

POLICE UPDATE

A S many of you will have read in the local press, I have taken over from PC Chris Janes as the Community Officer for the Paddock Wood and East Peckham area. I was for many years a 'Village Bobby' on this area but this is not a return to village policing.

My role now is to work with communities to help them to solve many of the local problems and issues. To this end, one of my initial tasks is to try to encourage more Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, Parish Constables, and Law and Order Working Groups.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEMES

Many villages have schemes which are very productive but there are large sections of my area which are missing out on valuable information. We now have a 'ring master' system where helpful local information is passed to existing schemes, usually within 24 hours, about crime trends, suspicious vehicles or persons etc. If you are not part of a scheme you are unaware and less prepared. Most of the effort is in setting up a scheme. Once running, like a good car, maintenance is low if looked after. To this end PC Janes has been appointed full time NHW officer and is responsible for collating all information to and from Schemes and helping with any problems that arise.

PARISH CONSTABLES

These are Special Constables who join to police their Parish. They are ordinary human beings like you but who volunteer to assist the police in their town or parish. They are given initial and continuous training, encouragement and assistance by qualified regular officers under the umbrella of the Community Unit and work alongside the Community Officer.

They are not asked to tackle anything they cannot handle and are regularly assessed. Only when they and the assessor are satisfied do they patrol alone. They have the same powers and insurance cover of regular officers whilst on duty.

LAW AND ORDER WORKING GROUPS

These groups are being set up within villages and towns to work with the police to identify local problems and the appropriate way to deal with them. This will not always be the heavy hand of the law, sometimes the environment being changed will give the correct result. It is for us all to find the right solution and that is why residents with an interest or skill will make up these groups along with the police and parish council members.

If anyone would like to talk to me in confidence about any of the above proposals or any long term problems, please contact me on the number below.

If you require an officer to attend an incident or crime happening at the time you MUST - repeat must - phone the relevant Police Station immediately.

I am not here to attend calls and to take the normal type of reports – emergencies are still 999. The Core Section working from Paddock Wood, Tunbridge Wells or Sevenoaks will still attend these.


